

## **The 50 Most Influential Lobbyists**

Rankings in the 1995 North Carolina General Assembly

The North Carolina Center for Public Policy Research conducted its legislative survey during the fall of 1995, after the adjournment of the regular session. All state Senators and Representatives, 371 legislative liaisons and lobbyists based in North Carolina, and 26 capital news correspondents were asked to list the ten most influential lobbyists and/or legislative liaisons during the 1995 session of the North Carolina General Assembly. Respondents received a list of all the lobbyists and legislative liaisons registered with the Secretary of State.

Ninety-four of the 120 House members (78%) responded to the Center's survey, as did 40 of the 50 Senators (80%), 148 of the 371 legislative liaisons and registered lobbyists based in North Carolina (40%), and 8 of 26 capital news correspondents (31%). The overall rate of response was 51%.

During the 1995 session, 500 lobbyists were registered with the Secretary of State, representing 576 different companies or organizations. The Center's calculations of the number of lobbyists counts each lobbyist only once, even if they represent more than one client. There were also 286 legislative liaisons representing 44 different state government agencies and licensing boards.

The following pages list the 50 most influential lobbyists during the 1995 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, as ranked by legislators, fellow lobbyists, and the capital news correspondents. Where applicable, rankings from previous legislative sessions are included. Whether the lobbyist is a former legislator or lawyer also is indicated.

The Center identifies public policy issues facing North Carolina and enriches the dialogue among citizens, the media, and policymakers. Based on its research, the Center makes recommendations for improving the way government serves the people of this state. In all its efforts, the Center values reliable and objective research as a basis for analyzing public policy, independence from partisan bias and political ideology, the richness of the state's diverse population, and a belief in the importance of citizen involvement in public life.

The Center was formed in 1977 by a diverse group of private citizens "for the purpose of gathering, analyzing, and disseminating information concerning North Carolina's institutions of government." It is a nonpartisan organization guided by a self-elected Board of Directors and has individual and corporate members across the state.

Center projects include the issuance of special reports on major policy questions; the publication of a magazine called *North Carolina Insight*; joint productions of public affairs radio programs with WUNC-FM and public radio stations in North Carolina; and the regular participation of members of the staff and the Board in public affairs programs around the state. The Center's research combines the thoroughness of scholarly research with the readability of good journal-ism. In each Center publication we try to amplify conflicting ideas on the subject under study and to reach conclusions based on sound rationalization of these competing ideas.
